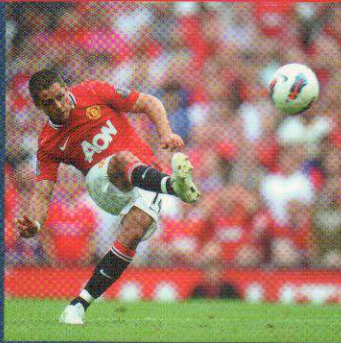

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About the book

English for Football has been developed specifically for people working in, or preparing to work in, the football industry who need to use English every day at work to communicate. The book will equip learners with the language skills and vocabulary necessary to understand typical situations in a football context.

English for Football consists of eight units. The book covers all the key positions on and off the pitch, from striker to manager. Units from the book work independently and can be selected according to the needs and interests of the course participants. *English for Football* can also be used for self-study.

Each unit begins with a **Kick-off**, which consists of a short exercise or quiz and serves as an introduction to the topic of the unit. Practical exercises, listening extracts, industry-specific texts, as well as photos and illustrations help you to acquire key vocabulary and expressions. Each unit closes with a **Profile** of a famous player followed by questions for reflection and discussion.

When you have completed the whole book you can **Test Yourself!** with the crossword on pages 70–71. In the appendix of *English for Football* you will also find a **Boardgame**, and the **Answer key** so that you can check your own answers if you are working alone. There are **Transcripts** of the **Listening** extracts. There is also an **A–Z wordlist** with all the key words that appear in *English for Football*. This includes a column of phonetics.

The **MultiROM** contains all the **Listening** extracts from the book. These can be played through the audio player on your computer, or through a conventional CD player. The **Interactive** exercises let you review your learning by doing exercises that cover the essential language from the book on your computer. This will be particularly valuable if you are using the book for self-study.

Foreword

by Sir Alex Ferguson



FOOTBALL today is a truly global phenomenon. Games are broadcast to vast audiences around the world, and replica team shirts are often worn in countries many thousands of kilometres from the clubs themselves. Players and staff increasingly migrate in pursuit of their careers; you only have to look at the composition of teams competing in the Champions League in Europe to see that.

Just as in business or science, in football too, people increasingly tend to use English to communicate. Significantly, this is also true of many football nations outside the English-speaking world where there are foreign players, coaches and so on.

In my own experience, I cannot stress how important it is for foreign players to be able to communicate with the coaching staff, medical team and team-mates in English both on and off the field.

Furthermore, it's fundamental for a player's integration that he can communicate confidently with fans, the media and with people in everyday situations. I am convinced this book will ease this adaptation process.

Moreover, I am sure it will also appeal to many speakers of other languages all over the world who simply wish to improve their knowledge of football-related English, or who just want to make learning English fun.

I like the word *mate*. It means friend. Everybody says this in Liverpool.

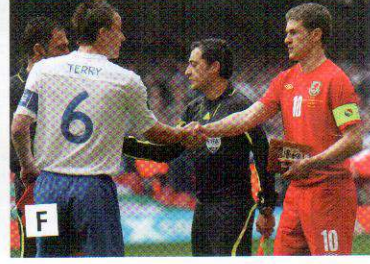
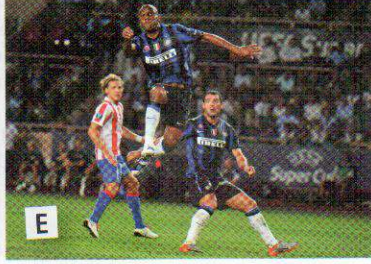
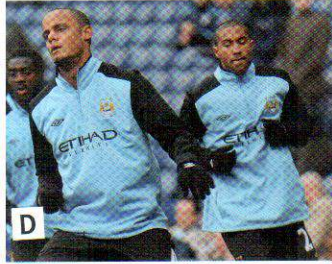
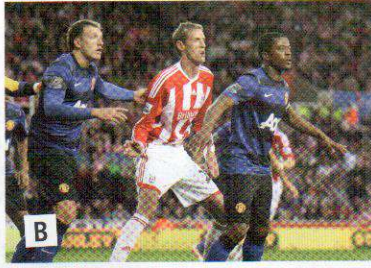
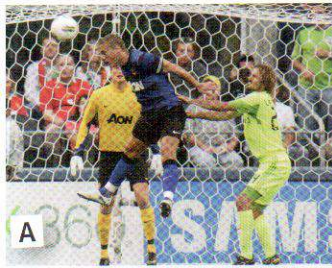

The Number 10

Pelé and Diego Maradona made the number 10 shirt famous. But it is sometimes difficult to understand the number 10 position. When we talk about the number 10 we are not always talking about the number on the shirt. We are talking about the footballer's job in the team.

Wayne Rooney, for example, wears the number 10 shirt, but he is not a number 10. He's a second striker.

We often see a number 10 in teams with a 4-2-3-1 formation. But the number 10 is not a player who runs forward from the centre of midfield, like Frank Lampard or Andrés Iniesta.

A number 10 plays in front of the midfielders and behind the strikers. He is the most important creative player in the team. He doesn't need to run past players, and he doesn't always score a lot of goals. He finds space on the pitch and helps to create chances. Luka Modric and David Silva often play in the number 10 position.

Many fantastic number 10s come from Argentina. One of my favourites is Juan Riquelme. In fact, he is my perfect number 10!

ROGER MILLA AT THE WORLD CUP



1982

In Spain in 1982, Cameroon played in the World Cup for the first time. They played against Peru in their first game. Roger Milla scored, but his goal was disallowed. The game ended 0-0. Cameroon also drew their next two games. They didn't qualify for the second round, but everybody liked the bright colours of the Cameroon kit and their supporters were fantastic! Roger didn't get his name on the scoresheet, but people noticed him. Italy were the competition winners.

1990

In 1990, the World Cup was in Italy. Cameroon qualified for the second time in their history. This time they reached the quarter-finals. Germany won the tournament, but Roger scored four goals and became famous for his goal celebrations. Every time he scored, he ran to the corner flag and started dancing. Today, lots of players do this kind of thing, but Roger was the first!

1994

Roger made his last World Cup appearance four years later in the USA. Brazil won the tournament. Cameroon didn't play well and they went out in the first round. In one game, Cameroon lost 6-1 to Russia. Oleg Salenko scored five goals in one match – a World Cup record. For Cameroon, Roger Milla broke a record too. He scored his only goal of the tournament and became the oldest goalscorer in the history of the World Cup. He was 42 years old!

Roger scored five goals at the World Cup between 1982 and 1994, and was later nominated as African Player of the Century. In 2004, Pelé included Roger on his FIFA 100 list of top players.

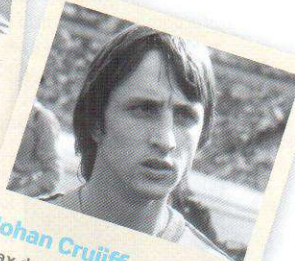

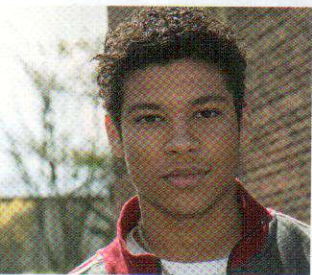

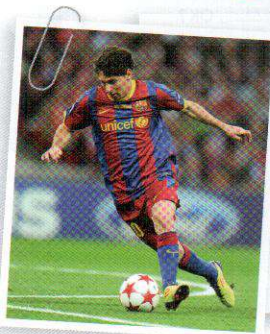

Brazilian players Ronaldo and Ronaldinho were geniuses on the football pitch. They could do anything with the ball, but they also did the basic things well. A striker often receives the ball with his back to goal and with no team-mate near him to receive a pass. In this situation the striker must use his body strength to keep the ball from the defender until he has a team-mate to pass to. This is called 'holding the ball up.'

Was it a big change for you to come and play in England?

Well, yes and no, because I had experience of European football at Ajax. It's not easy, but I think that top strikers have to score goals wherever they go!

Brazil and Argentina are traditionally the most successful teams in South America. Can Uruguay change that tradition?

Hey, Uruguay won the first ever World Cup! So history and tradition are on our side! Of course, Brazil and Argentina have a lot of quality players, but I think we have the same technique and ability as them.

Do South American teams enjoy attacking more than European teams?

Yes, I think so. Some teams have one forward who scores a lot of goals and other attacking players who create a lot. But when Uruguay won the Copa America in 2011, we had Diego Forlan, Edinson Cavani and me in the squad. We're three players who create and score a lot of goals!

Do you get frustrated if you don't score in a game?

Of course, I love to score goals. Obviously, if we win, I'm happy. But if we win and I've scored a goal, I'm happier!

It's often difficult to view footballers as normal people.

What do you like to do when you're not playing football?

Probably the same as you! I like movies, music and visiting new places. But the most important thing for me is my family. Every goal that I score is for them.

A GREAT NEW GAME!

Danny, a video game designer, describes how he created the goalkeeper for his latest game.

I'm a bit different from other football game designers because I play a lot of football myself. I'm a goalkeeper, so for me it was important for the goalkeeper to be as realistic as possible. I watched DVDs of top-class keepers in action. I spoke to some real keepers, too. A lot of people gave us advice, and I think we have done a great job!



In this game, the keeper reacts differently in different situations. For simple shots he can catch it, and for shots that are going towards the top corner, he can tip the ball over the bar. The keeper can also use his body to make a block. I wanted the crosses to look realistic too, so the keeper can choose to come for the cross or stay on his goal line. When the keeper collects a cross or punches the ball, the supporters chant his name. But if he misses the cross, the fans boo him!

In real football, communication is very important for a keeper, especially during set-pieces. So in the game, you can record and upload ten different phrases for each player. So your keeper can shout instructions, like 'Switch on!' when you want the defenders to concentrate.

Finally, I'm especially pleased with the keeper's distribution. In a lot of football video games, the keeper just rolls the ball to the nearest player, or plays a long ball to the striker. Our goalkeeper has a lot more variety in his goal kicks, kick-outs, and throws. We worked hard on details like this, and I'm confident that the game will be a success.

FOOTBALL LEGENDS:

CENI & CHILAVERT

Rogério Ceni and Luis Chilavert have a few things in common. They are South American. They have had long careers. They have been team captains. And, perhaps most incredibly of all, they are goalkeepers who have scored lots of goals! Their goals have come from penalties or free-kicks.

They were born and grew up 600 km apart. Ceni is from Pato Branco in Brazil, while Chilavert is from Luque in Paraguay. Chilavert has scored over 60 professional goals in his career, while Ceni has scored more than 100 professional goals in over 1,000 appearances for São Paulo!

CHILAVERT

At international level, Ceni has been to two World Cups, 2002 and 2006. But he wasn't first-choice keeper for Brazil during these competitions, and ended up with a total of only ten minutes on the pitch. On the other hand, Chilavert played for Paraguay at the 1998 and 2002 World Cups, and did quite well. He took the free-kicks for his team, and almost scored against Spain.

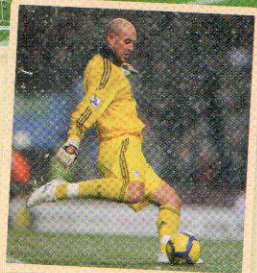
SPANISH KEEPERS

I'm a Spanish supporter and, in Spain, our goalkeeping situation has become a big problem. For some countries, it's difficult to find even one good goalkeeper. For a few years, we have had too many to choose from!

Iker Casillas, Pepe Reina, David de Gea and Víctor Valdés have all played club football for some of the biggest teams in the world. But of course, only one can play for the national team. So, since 2010, the other three keepers have had to fight for a place on the bench.

All four goalkeepers are excellent in every department: positioning, commanding the penalty area, organizing the defence, distribution and, of course, they are great **shot-stoppers**¹. I have seen all of these players make **match-winning saves**² in important games. I remember when de Gea saved a Diego Milito penalty in the European Super Cup!

The secrets of scouting

Liverpool FC scout, Frank McParland, has a lot of experience finding new players. Here he gives us a guide to what he looks for in players in each position.



- When I'm looking for a _____, I want a player who can dribble and beat defenders. He must be good at crossing, and he has to have enough pace to track back after an attack **breaks down**¹.
- _____ is a very important position for me. Somebody in this position has to be good in the air, and at **organizing**² the players around him. He doesn't have to be very fast if he has good positioning sense. He must be brave, and good at tackling.
- A good _____ should have excellent marking ability. Pace is also important. If he is going forward to support attacks, he needs to be able to get back into position quickly. He should also be able to tackle well with both feet, in case the player he's marking cuts inside.
- I always look for a _____ who has good **reflexes**³. He should be quite tall, although he doesn't have to be a giant! He has to control the penalty area and, ultimately, he has to be trusted by his defence.

COACH OR MANAGER?

Friends often ask me why I was a coach in Spain, but a manager in England. The answer is that while all managers are coaches, not all coaches are managers!



COACH

In Spain, I arrived at the training ground every morning and I coached the team. After the training sessions I prepared the team for the next game. I showed the players videos of our next opponents and discussed the tactics and formation I wanted to use. We also reviewed our previous game, and talked about how we could improve. I enjoyed advising key players on things like their positional play. Every weekend, I picked the team, gave the team-talk, and after the game I gave a press conference.

In Spain, the club president normally makes decisions on signing players. Once a president sent me an email to ask my opinion of a player he was going to sign. I told him, 'Don't sign that player! He is a bad influence in the dressing room.' The next morning, on my way to training, I heard on the radio that we were signing the player!

MANAGER

After three successful seasons in Spain, I went to England and became a manager. I soon discovered that it was a 24-hour-a-day job. On the first day, the chairman said, 'Tell me which players you're going to sell, and which players you're going to buy!' Instead of working with the players, I spent most of my first two weeks meeting with scouts and players' agents. In Spain, the president and the club's general manager did this type of work.

In England I had several coaches who helped me prepare the team for games, and who normally led the training sessions. But it was my job to select the starting 11. I also spoke with the media, and did press conferences.

As manager I didn't have enough time to work with individual players. Instead I worked with the players as a group every day. I had meetings all the time: at the club academy; with our scouts; with the chairman; and with all of the other coaches at the club, even at schoolboy level.

I prefer working directly with players. So at the end of the season I returned to Spain.

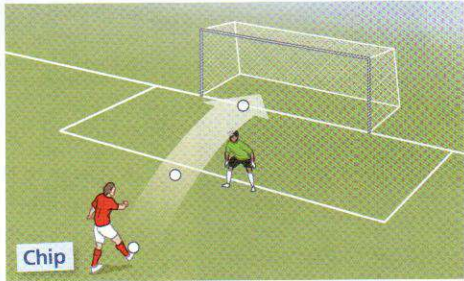

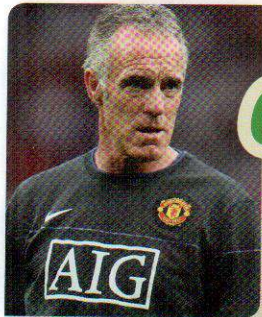

If you're left-footed, the ball curves from right to left when you do this. The famous left-footed player Roberto Carlos scored a fantastic goal for Brazil against France with this type of shot from a free-kick.
- 2 It's best to try this type of shot when the keeper is off his line. The ball starts on the ground and you lean forward when you kick the ball. You try to get your foot under the ball as much as possible. The ball normally goes high and, if you're good at it, it drops over the keeper's head and into the goal.
- 3 For this type of shot, the ball must be in the air and the keeper must be off his line. You kick the ball over the goalkeeper's head. It's best to side-foot the ball to get the most control on your shot. You don't get the opportunity to score a goal like this very often.
- 4 This type of shot is used a lot by free-kick specialists. In the past, David Beckham was famous for his ability to shoot from free-kicks using this type of shot. You kick the ball with the inside of your foot and it is very effective for getting the ball around the defensive wall when you're taking a free-kick.

Goalkeeping coach

Responsibilities

The main responsibility is to give the manager options. My job is to prepare the keeper in four areas: technical, tactical, physical and mental. That means I take a lot of interest in what the keeper is eating, how focused he is in the gym, and above all, how he's feeling!


Training sessions

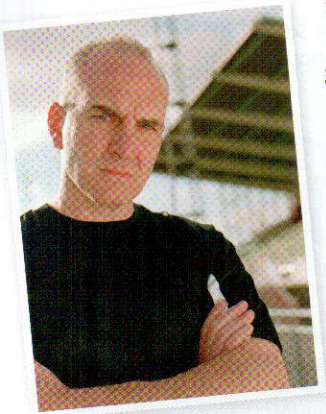
When I'm planning training sessions, I always start with the game in mind, and work back from that. I want to be clear about the keeper's frame of mind the day before the game. Actually, I prefer not to talk too much on the day of the game. And for away games there's a lot more preparation, especially if the keeper has no experience of playing at a particular ground, in a particular atmosphere. You need a degree of variety, so I like to use DVDs and computers when I'm explaining tactics. Most importantly, you need to be flexible. That means you have to be able to listen to the keepers and ask them, 'What do you need?'

Competition

Having competition among your keepers is also very important. Keeper number three has to understand that at any minute, he can become keeper number two. This happens when there's an injury for instance. Suddenly he's on the bench with a chance of becoming number one! I always tell the lads that their job demands them to be available to give their best, 365 days of the year. And they have to be able to work together. Generally, there's great solidarity. The attitude is this: 'We support each other, but we compete!'

This usually involves taking off an attacking player and replacing him with a more defensive substitute. 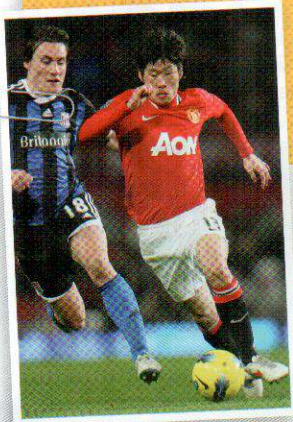

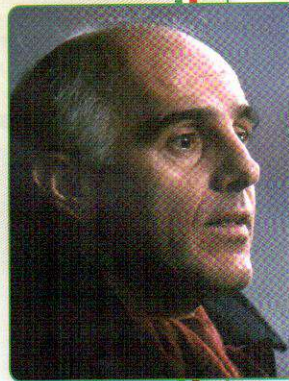

ARRIGO SACCHI

Managers such as José Mourinho and Arrigo Sacchi have shown that you don't need to have much experience as a player to reach the top as a manager.

Sacchi never played professionally. In fact, he worked as a shoe salesman! But when people said he didn't have enough experience to be a manager, Sacchi famously answered, 'I didn't know you had to be a horse before you could become a jockey!'

He took Italy to the World Cup Final in 1994, but people remember him more for his fantastic AC Milan team. In fact, with AC Milan, he became the only manager to have back-to-back wins in the European Cup (today's Champions League) in 1989 and 1990. The same team also won the Italian league title in 1988, the European Super Cup in 1989 and 1990, and the Intercontinental Cup (today's Club World Cup) also in 1989 and 1990.



A lot of people at the time said there were too many foreigners in the AC Milan team. This is perhaps hard for us to understand, especially because they only had three non-Italian regular starters: the wonderful Dutch trio of Marco van Basten, Frank Rijkaard, and Ruud Gullit.

Today's teams are so international that José Mourinho's Inter won the Champions League Final in 2010 with not a single Italian in the starting line-up. And there weren't too many Inter fans who complained!

Sacchi is famous for his system of pressing and zonal marking. He says that a great team is one 'in which players are connected to each other, which moves together, as if it were a single player'. Just like his famous Milan team! Many people believe they were the strongest club side of all time – even better than the Barcelona team of recent years.

THE GREATEST DEFENDER



The first defender to appear in the FIFA World Player of the Year top three was Paolo Maldini who came second in 1995. Another Italian legend, Fabio Cannavaro, went one better when he won the award in 2006. However, many people think the greatest defender of all time was Franz Beckenbauer of Germany.

Beckenbauer played in a defensive position known as 'sweeper' or 'libero'. This position hasn't been very popular recently, but a sweeper plays between the two centre-backs. In fact, Beckenbauer's job was to play as a fifth defender, to break up opposition attacks, and then get forward to start attacks for his own team.

In Beckenbauer's first season with Bayern Munich in 1964, they got promoted to the Bundesliga. Even as a young player, Beckenbauer had a very professional attitude to the way he got ready for games. He had a good understanding of the tactics of the game, too.

Beckenbauer was a runner-up in his first World Cup in 1966. He had to wait until his third World Cup before winning it. When the Netherlands got through to the 1974 World Cup Final, most football writers agreed that they were the best team in the world. But in the final, Beckenbauer marked Johan Crujff and stopped him from playing well. Crujff just couldn't get past Beckenbauer, and Germany were crowned World Champions.

Although Beckenbauer's main role in the team was to get back and break up attacks, he was also a fantastic dribbler, and he scored a lot of goals.

Beckenbauer had a very successful career. He won the European Cup three times, and the Bundesliga four times. He is also the only player in history to have captained and managed a World Cup winning side – he managed the West Germany team that won the 1990 World Cup.

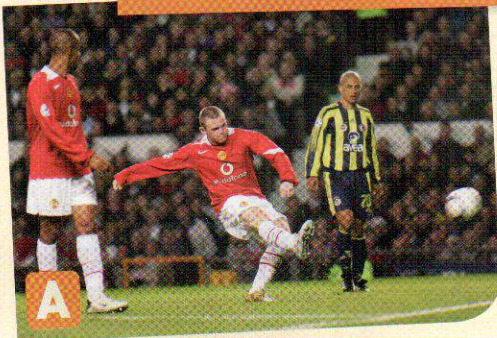

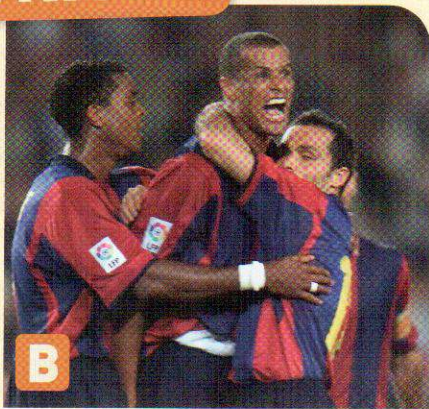

THE GREATEST OF THEM ALL?

On the last day of the 2000-01 season in Spain, Brazilian legend Rivaldo scored a **dramatic**¹ hat-trick for Barcelona against Valencia.

The quality of the goals was **incredible**²: a free-kick that was 30 metres from goal; another shot from a **similar**³ distance; and then in the 89th minute, a perfect overhead kick from **the edge of the area**⁴.

What really made Rivaldo a Camp Nou hero that night was the fact that Barcelona needed to win the game in order to qualify for the Champions League ahead of Valencia. Rivaldo's goal gave them a dramatic 3-2 win. Of course, with quality players like Rivaldo in the squad, managers feel there will always be **opportunities**⁵ to score in games. But Rivaldo left this fantastic match-winner very late – right until the last minute of the season!

PIERLUIGI COLLINA

The first major final that Collina refereed was the 1999 Champions League Final between Manchester United and Bayern Munich. The score after 90 minutes was 1-0 to Bayern, but as the fourth official held up the electronic board to signal three minutes of added time, United substitute Teddy Sheringham scored an equalizer. Then, as the players and fans were waiting for Collina to blow the final whistle, United scored again! Collina only gave one yellow card in the game. People remember the way he helped Bayern players to stand up after their shock defeat.

The 2002 World Cup Final is famous for being the game in which Ronaldo equalled Pelé's career World Cup goals total. The Brazilian scored his 11th and 12th World Cup goals, and Germany were unable to answer. Germany

missed their midfielder Michael Ballack, who wasn't playing after getting booked in the semi-final against South Korea. The greatest thing about Collina's performance is that people don't remember it – for a referee, that's a good thing!

Collina took charge of the 2004 UEFA Cup Final between Marseille and Valencia. In the 45th minute of the game, Marseille goalkeeper Fabien Barthez brought down Valencia player Mista in the penalty area. Collina pointed to the spot and sent Barthez off. Although people remember Collina for this controversy, it was a good decision. Valencia scored the penalty, and later added a second goal. Marseille failed to score. The game is famous for Amedeo Carboni, at 39, becoming the oldest player to win a European cup final.

PELÉ AND THE WORLD CUP

Pelé is the only player to have won three World Cups. He made his World Cup debut in Sweden in 1958 at the age of 17. He scored a hat-trick against France in the semi-final and then two more in the final against Sweden. It was a spectacular World Cup for a 17-year-old. He is still the youngest scorer at a World Cup, as well as the youngest scorer of a hat-trick in a World Cup and the youngest scorer in a World Cup Final!

PELÉ AND HIS GOALS

Pelé scored lots of goals. He scored more than 1,200 goals in professional football, and more than 90 hat-tricks. Even though he has scored so many goals he is also famous for goals that he didn't score. In a 1970 World Cup match against England, it was his header that forced a save from Gordon Banks that many think was the greatest save of all time. And in the same competition, against Czechoslovakia, Pelé tried to chip the goalkeeper with a shot from inside his own half. It went just wide of the post.

Pelé says that his favourite goal was his 1,000th goal. It wasn't an overhead kick or a classic header – it was a penalty! But for Pelé, this meant that everybody was able to stop and watch it.

PELÉ'S FAVOURITE MOMENTS

And what two moments have given Pelé most satisfaction? His first choice is the World Cup in 1958 which was like a dream for him – a party! And his second was the World Cup in 1970 when he was an experienced player. The country of Brazil had many problems at that time. There was enormous pressure on the team, and a particular responsibility on Pelé himself – the team had to win. And they certainly did it in style. Many people feel that the goal scored by Carlos Alberto in the final against Italy was the greatest goal of all time. Pelé, of course, made the final pass.

Pelé is now an honorary ambassador for the 2014 World Cup in Brazil.

- I** Your next choice is Johan Cruyff ...
JS Cruyff was technically perfect and, as a Barcelona supporter, I watched him play every week. He was a great goal-scorer, but he also created a lot of goals. Cruyff often dribbled past five or six players and then passed the ball to a team-mate to score. Cruyff had good timing and nearly always made the right decision.
I Diego Maradona scored some amazing goals. Did you see him play at Barcelona too?
JS Yes, and I also followed his career with Napoli and Argentina. Maradona played with balance, strength and pace. He ran past defenders. Football looked easy! He also distributed the ball with great intelligence.
I What did these players have in common?

I Are there any modern players who can join this group?
JS At the moment, Lionel Messi is the only player with the quality to join this group. He's so difficult to stop, and he's got incredible composure! He's so cool.

 I Do you enjoy training?
 BA Oh, definitely! Especially games with the first team, but also work on specific goalkeeping things such as low shots or high balls. Training's important because it's my big opportunity to show the manager what I can do. I always try to do my best.

- I What is your goalkeeping coach like?
 BA He's really professional and he helps me a lot. But he likes to make jokes too! He's very important because he plans quality training sessions. He prepares me for games and gives me advice, particularly when I make a mistake. I like him because he's honest with me.
 I What are your team-mates like?
 BA They're all good lads, and we get on. I've always tried to learn from the top players, especially from Edwin van der Sar when he was playing. He was so experienced, and had fantastic positioning. He really helped me to be professional, on and off the pitch.

- I What is your diet like?
 BA I'm quite careful about what I eat and drink. I try to eat healthy food. It's not good for keepers to eat too many carbohydrates, so I don't eat things like rice or bread for dinner. I also enjoy drinking litres and litres of water for hydration.
 I What are your days off like?
 BA I don't get many, but they're great! I like to do other sports to help me as a keeper. I started swimming after a shoulder injury and I discovered I really enjoy it. Table tennis is great for goalkeepers too! It helps to improve your reactions.

- 1 German goalkeeper Bert Trautman was a prisoner in the north of England during World War Two. After the war, he stayed in England and became a Manchester City legend. He helped City win the FA Cup in 1956. During the final, he injured his neck, but he stayed on the pitch and finished the game. He even went out to celebrate the victory after the match. Three days later he had an X-ray, and doctors found that Trautman had a broken bone in his neck!
 2 In 2002, Santiago Cañizares was the first-choice keeper for Spain. But he missed the World Cup that year after an accident in his room at the team hotel! He dropped a bottle of aftershave and a piece of glass went into his foot, cutting through a tendon. He needed an operation. Iker Casillas went to the tournament as first-choice keeper in his place.

- 3 In October 2006, Petr Čech, Chelsea's goalkeeper from the Czech Republic, suffered a head injury in the first minute of a game against Reading. Petr Čech left the field and Carlo Cudicini came on. But he was also injured, and John Terry finished the game in goal. It was only later that people realized how serious Čech's injury was. He had surgery on his skull and returned in January 2008 wearing a rugby-style headguard which he has continued to wear ever since.

I'm Richard. I'm a tactical scout. This means that I go to watch teams that my club will play against. I've never signed a player: that's not my job. The most important thing for me is to write everything down. It's essential to get players' names right! Above all, I look for goal-scoring ability. I've been a scout for 15 years and my best moment was when we won the Cup last year. Before the final, I told the manager that two of the opposition penalty-takers always kick it low and hard into the bottom right corner. The game went to penalties, and our keeper saved the penalties by those players.

It's important that the other keepers in the session are really focused and able to work to a very high standard. If things aren't perfect, the number one'll get angry or even lose respect for the coach.
